

The Davidson team won the football game from the University of South Carolina eleven yesterday at the fair grounds in the first half, 22 points being scored as a result of four touchdowns and two goals. In the second half the Garnet and Black buckled down to work and held their opponents to a 0-0 contest for the remainder of the game. The reversal of form by the local team was a feature of the game, and showed that the University eleven was not outclassed as much as many persons imagined.

With the winning of the game against Carolina, Couch Levine perces have two games to their credit in is ming days, which he quite a record. With the exception .. Federa and Clark, the Red and Black began the game with the same lineup as was put against the Clemson Tigers the day before. However, before the end of the second half seven men had been substituted on the Davidson squad.

The day was ideal for a football contest, and as a result the attendance was swelled considerably and there was much more enjoyment in witnessing the game and in taking part in it. Just the day before the ground at the athletic field was wet and soggy from continuous rains of two days' duration. Yesterday morning those who

started Davidson was able to make consistent gains through the line and on forward passes. Especially in the latter was Davidson successful in the first half of the game. A somewhat unusual occurrence was the scoring of a touchdown by means of a forward pass-Elliott to Kluttz-in this half.

Carolina was off in the use of the forward pass, and was several times penalized or lost the ball in failures to make this play succeed. It was expected by many that this would be a very potent factor in Carolina's offensive work. As a matter of fact, the Garatt and Black was able to gain more halfback plays over tackle.
